The false security of the popular teaching of "eternal security"

John 3:16 For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life.

There are some who interpret this well known scripture to guarantee eternal life in Heaven for those who at some point in their lives have believed in Jesus Christ - regardless of how they then live. Other scriptures do not support this interpretation:

- Rom 2:5-7 ...God, who "will render to each one according to his deeds":

 eternal life to those who by patient continuance in doing good seek
 for glory, honor and immortality (from God to those who do His will)
- Heb 5:9 And having been perfected, He (Jesus) became the author of <u>eternal</u> <u>salvation to all who obey Him</u>, (not just occasionally but all the time)

And there is no inconsistency here: The latter two scriptures make it clear that a continuing life of faith towards God, reflected in obedience to His leadings and producing an abundance of good works, results in eternal life. That's why in John 3:16 the "whoever believes in Him" is in the continual present tense, meaning who-ever keeps on actively believing, obeying and doing the will of God, will not perish.

Often the following scripture is cited as a basis for presuming that once a person is converted to Christ they are eternally secure or as it is put once saved always saved.

John 10:28 And <u>I give them eternal life</u>, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of My hand.

But who are the "them" to whom Jesus refers in this scripture? The preceding verse answers this question: The "them" are His sheep who hear His voice and follow Him:

John 10:27 My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me.

And what does He mean when Jesus says His sheep hear His voice and follow Him and therefore receive eternal life? He answers that clearly in the following scripture:

Luke 9:23 Then He said to them all, "<u>If anyone</u> desires to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me".

And to "deny himself and take up his cross daily" in order to follow Jesus means to live in a continuing state of belief that he has been crucified with Christ to his flesh or to his sin nature (Gal 2:20 and Rom 6:6). He therefore, being freed from sin, can now be led, moment by moment, by the Holy Spirit as a son of God (Rom 8:14) – and follow Jesus. Salvation, the root meaning of which is to be eternally safe, is not then a one time event but rather an ever growing faith relationship with the living and loving God that produces much fruit into the lives of others – it is the life of a disciple.

Jam 2:20 Are you willing to be shown, O foolish man, that faith without works (works which reflect faith, which God inspires in those who hear His voice) is dead?

Faith not constantly fed, nor evidenced by works, dies, and cannot inherit eternal life.
